OUR MISSION

Our purpose is to be the **voice** and **connector** for our members by providing **resources**, **education** and **advocacy** to strengthen and ensure **high-quality health care** for people who are **vulnerable**.

OUR HISTORY

In early 2000, several free clinics in Northeast Ohio determined the need for a collective body resenting agencies that provide free health care throughout the state. Funding from Volunteers in Health Care supported our first annual Free Clinic Conference in October 2000, at which approximately 20 clinics were represented. The participants authorized a steering committee to pursue incorporation of the Ohio Association of Free Clinics (OAFC). The Association was incorporated in November 2000 and received approval for 501(c)(3) status in May 2002. The first executive director was hired in August 2002.

In 2018, our name was officially changed to Charitable Healthcare Network. CHN is supported by General Revenue Funds from the Ohio Department of Health as well as foundations and generous individual donors.



THANK YOU, DEB MILLER!

Deborah Miller served with Charitable Healthcare Network as the Executive Director from October 2012 to January 2022. There have been many accomplishments during Miller's tenure. Some notable highlights include meeting with legislators in 2019 which resulted in the increase of the state budget line item from \$362,000 to \$1.5 million per year! In 2018, Miller helped with changing the association's name from Ohio Association of Free Clinics to Charitable Healthcare Network. This change helped the association to expand and include more members such as charitable pharmacies, specialty clinics and free/sliding care home visiting and case management agencies.

Under Miller's leadership, CHN was able to help members face the challenge of a lifetime: COVID -19. Her leadership persevered and CHN was able to help members with over \$400,000 in information Technology grants, \$218,000 worth of donated PPE and medical supplies, many zoom educational meetings and new partnerships to bring vaccines and much needed supplies to our members during this challenging time.

There is so much more that Deborah Miller accomplished during her time at CHN, and we are grateful for her leadership and vision which helped move CHN forward.














NAVIGATOR GRANT


In September 2021, CHN signed into a contract with the Ohio Association of Foodbanks to get funding for inurance navigators to be placed across the state. Since the beginning of the grant period, we have hired on 11 navigators who are working in various locations. While many of our navigators work out of a CHN member clinic, some work completely remote. But no matter where they are located, each of our navigators have been dedicated to helping enroll as many consumers as they can in health insurance.

We are grateful to be able to provide this service to Ohio's uninsured. Seeing as a majority of patients who come into our clinics are uninsured, it is obvious that there is a need for navigators to help get more Ohioans enrolled.


INSURED VS. UNINSURED OHIOANS BY AGE GROUP, 2015-2019




INSURED VS. UNINSURED OHIOANS BY RACE, 2015-2019



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OUR STORIES

We met an incredible patient at a clinic not too long ago at one of our medical clinics. Our volunteer doctor was able to catch the early signs of cancer at our clinic and our Navigation team connected her with ongoing care at CCF, where her life was saved, and her bills were nearly 100% covered. After that, she came to us for her COVID vaccine and continues to work with our Navigation team for ongoing care. She attended our annual fundraiser and told her story to our donors, which did not leave a dry eye in the house. A few months later, she was featured on Channel 5 news. Our staff considers her a friend and we are honored to know her.

For patients like "Walter" that are still experiencing heightened challenges from COVID-19, the need for the Charitable Pharmacy's free, accessible pharmaceutical care is critical. Walter is 83 years old and came to the St. Vincent de Paul – Cincinnati (SVDP) and Charitable Pharmacy's shared Neyer Outreach Center with financial hardship. Upon speaking with an SVDP social services' advocate for the first time, it was clear that Walter was using his rent money to cover medical costs. As a neighbor enrolled in a Medicare Part D plan, Walter was subject to copays for his much-needed inhalers and hypertension medication. The advocate ensured that Walter was connected with financial assistance for rent, but not without also referring him to the Charitable Pharmacy for immediate care in the same space. Because of the Charitable Pharmacy's emergency medication voucher program, Walter was able to transfer 8 prescriptions from his retail pharmacy and get each one filled at no charge immediately after his social services appointment.

During the process of redeeming his emergency medication voucher, the Charitable Pharmacy's Patient Advocate recognized another concern—Walter was food insecure. Staff and volunteers subsequently rallied around Walter to ensure that he was connected to the SVDP Choice Food Pantry, in the same space, and immediately provided with a full grocery cart. After receiving rent assistance, medications, and food at no charge to his household, Walter was faced with yet another complication of poverty: a lack of transportation. Walter was not able to transport all of his new items on the bus. The Charitable Pharmacy arranged for transportation that would ensure that Walter could get to his home with his food, supplies, and medications in hand.

Walter's story is but one of many that highlights the capacity of assistance that is afforded to patients of the Charitable Pharmacy. Each person benefits from holistic care that addresses their critical health needs alongside of the social determinants of health that impact the root causes of poverty.

Our greatest success story is in the lives of our patients. They have overcome tremendous barriers to good health, primarily in the areas of employment, education, language and transportation. Often, they are struggling with their basic needs -- healthcare becomes low on their priority list when they are worried about housing and nutrition. Despite that, we have seen patients counting us among their greatest resources. Enhanced follow-up has kept many from slipping through the safety net and they are on the path toward improved health and a better quality of life. For some, we became their bridge, keeping them healthy while between jobs and insurance. For others, we became their lifeline. Abigail, for example, is an 89-year-old immigrant non-citizen with no family. She is diabetic, has no transportation and speaks no English. Abigail never misses an appointment, comes with a smile and has kept her conditions under control. She calls LCFC a Godsend and blessing in her life and is quick to tell others about her care. She does not trust easily, but confides in LCFC -- and that is our true success story. LCFC is a respected, safe space in the community for patients of all backgrounds.

"My dental pain was so bad, but I had no money to get the tooth out. I needed to decide between paying my rent or getting this taken care of. A friend told me about Stowe's free dental. I'm so thankful to get my tooth taken care of while not getting behind on my bills."

"We always had health insurance through Deb's job, but in 2014-2015, Deb had a bad run and had six surgeries in those two years. Even though we had insurance, our portion of it was astronomical. She ended up losing her job, and it bankrupted us. A friend of Deb's told her about OPEN M, and we became patients in 2015 with very few resources at the time. I was working as a contractor, so I didn't have insurance, and we were really struggling to keep things going. We saw the doctors there and got help with our meds. In 2016, Deb had breast cancer and was diagnosed as diabetic and became insulin-dependent. The clinic doctors are fantastic. We have nothing but good things to say about everyone there. No one has ever made us feel like we're at a free clinic. The doctors want to be there to help you, and you feel that. We've seen the clinic grow during our time there, too, and begin to offer more. We've seen nutritionists, a pulmonary doctor, an endocrinologist and a cardiologist, and participate in the chiropractic and acupuncture programs. It is a pleasant experience every time we go there; we love the place."

SUPPLY PICK-UP

For the past 5 years, thanks to our partnership with Otto Orf and the Hands on Sports Foundation, we have been lucky enough to have millions of dollars worth of medical supplies available to our members at no charge. Members were able to drive up to the warehouse location where the supplies were housed, and go through the boxes to take whatever they needed.

In 2021, we had 2 suppy pick-ups, one in April and another in September. Both pick-ups brought in many of our members who were able to get car loads full of free PPE to use at their clinics.







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ANNUAL SAFETY-NET SYMPOSIUM

In August 2021, we held our Safety-Net Symposium, "Power Up for Success" at the Sonesta Hotel in Columbus, OH. We initially began planning for this symposium back in the fall of 2019, and due to the pandemic, had to push it back a year later than expected. We finally got to gather in person after 18 months of planning, and it was just what our network needed to recharge after such a strenuous period.

Conference attendees elevated their healthcare industry knowledge through a series of speakers, and were able to share their successes, challenges and insights with one another.

Keynote speaker, Elizabeth Beverly, Ph.D. captivated attendees with her presentation, "Using Virtual Reality to Visualize Diabetes in Ohio." This unique presentation utilized virtual reality to give participants the opportunity to experience chronic disease management and the social determinants of health from a patient's perspective.

Plenary speaker, Angela Dawson, received raved reviews from conference attendees on her presentation, "Policy and Race Matters: Eliminating Health and Healthcare Disparities to Achieve Health Equity," where she discussed racial and ethnic health and health care disparities, the impact of structural racism, and the role of historic and contemporary policies as key drivers of these inequities.

The rest of the conference consisted of 16 more speakers spanning across 5 breakout sessions where participants got to choose which sessions they wanted to attend. The symposium also integrated many networking opportunites including a Resource Reception and Networking Event, as well as a faciliatated discussion group session, and our Annual Meeting.
